All the trees are indigenous to Indiana, and were donated by local people in honor or memory of loved ones. Each tree has a marker depicting its species and honoree.

Also in the Arboretum, there is a Sycamore called the Space Tree," because the seeds from which it was grown flew aboard the Space Shuttle Atlantis on December 2-6, 1988 for Indiana's County 4-H Clubs. It flew 1.8 million miles!

State Seal-1816

Found on official territory papers as early as 1801, the seal depicts a typical pioneer scene. It was designed to portray the westward expansion, and the setting sun signifies Indiana as a foothold in the west for America. There were more than 200 variations of the seal between 1816-1963, when the General Assembly, by law, set it to look as it does now. The hills shown are from the area west of Vincennes. The buffalo is symbolic of our rich natural resources.



State Bird – 1933

The Cardinal is the state bird. The male is a brilliant red with tints of gray on their backs and black markings on their beaks. The females are olive gray and buff, with flecks of red on their wings. Cardinals are members of the Finch family and are seen all year long in Indiana.

State Song – 1913

"On the Banks of the Wabash Far Away" was written by Paul Dresser, whose brother was novelist Theodore Dreiser. He was born in Terre Haute and wrote several best selling songs.

State Tree – 1931

The Tulip Tree is also known as the Yellow Poplar. It has showy yellow blossoms which resemble tulips. It is the tallest broad leaf tree in the U.S. Its wood is chiefly used for furniture.



State Flower – 1957

The Peony is found in shades of Red, Pink, and White. The Peony belongs to the Buttercup family. Green and red leafy shoots appear before the blooms open in late May.



State Stone – 1971

Limestone is quarried in south & central Indiana from the geologic formation named Salem Limestone

State Motto - 1937

"The Crossroads of America."



State Flag-1917

Our flag was adopted as part of the commemoration of the State's Centennial, and was designed by Paul Hadley of Mooresville. The central torch stands for liberty and enlightenment, and the surrounding rays represent their far-reaching influence. The 13 stars of the outer circle represent the original colonies; the 5 inner circle stars represent the 5 additional states admitted to the union before Indiana. The Large star centered over the flames signifies Indiana itself. Our flag has golden symbols on a field of navy blue.
