Leona Hoffman

Mrs. Leona HOFFMAN, 73, of Argos became St. Joseph county's first traffic fatality of 1949 when she died shortly before noon Saturday in the South Bend Memorial hospital. Death resulted from pneumonia which followed injuries she received in a crash Christmas Eve while riding in an auto with her son, Clarence Cox of South Bend. The accident occurred on U. S. Road 31 south of South Bend.

Mrs. Hoffman was born in Argos on Jan. 30, 1875, and her entire life was spent in that community. She was the daughter of Alfred and Anna McGRIFF. She was married to Truman HOFFMAN in 1908 and he preceded her in death in 1944.

Mrs. Hoffman was a lifetime member of the Argos Congregational Christian church.

Survivors are six children, Mrs. Mary KANOUSE of Argos; Mrs. Helen BONECUTTER of Marion, Ohio; Clarence COX of South Bend; Clarence resided in Rochester several years where he was employed as a pressman by the Van Trump Co; Bessie LANE and James HOFFMAN of South Bend; Ermil HOFFMAN of Valparaiso; a stepdaughter, Agnes SEIDER of Walkerton; twenty-three grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren.
