## Fulton County Public Library Arboretum Facts

All of the trees and shrubs planted in the Arboretum are indigenous to Indiana.

The pebbled sidewalk represents the Tippecanoe River as it meanders across northern Indiana.

The gazebo signifies that Fulton County is the "Round Barn Capital" of Indiana.

The cardinal, Indiana's state bird, was adopted in 1933.

In 1957 the peony became the state flower. The large pink and burgundy blooms may be enjoyed in late spring and early summer.

Limestone is the state stone. It was officially designated as such in 1971. A large sample in the Arboretum shows limestone in its natural state.

The tulip tree (also known as yellow poplar) was adopted in 1931 as the Indiana state tree.

The circle with the monument denotes Indiana's capital city of Indianapolis.
